OUR SUMMER IN REVIEW

We all know it was a hot, dry summer. This made for a great summer to enjoy Boot Lake water activities and a refreshing dip in warm 80 degree water in the middle of summer. For the record, we had 17 days over 90 degrees on Boot Lake this summer, with the high being 99F on June 4. It remained hot most of the summer with our last 90+ day on August 19. The lack of rain started early in the spring when we went without a drop of rain from May 1 through May 18. And we only got .6 of an inch of rain from that date on through June 21, when we finally got a nice rain of .58 of an inch. The lack of little or no rain continued through mid August. Many trees started to stress out and turn yellow or brown and drop their leaves. But then on August 21 we got a nice soaking of 1.43 in. of rain. And over the next 8 days we got nice rains totaling 1.6 in. of moisture. And dramatically almost overnight everything started to green up again. Our nice rains have continued into the fall with the US Weather Service stating we are no longer in an exceptional drought.

PUBLIC ACCESS WASHOUT

If you haven't noticed, there is a bit of a drop off at the end of the ramp at the public access. If you back your trailer in too far you risk dropping into a "hole" and might experience some difficulty pulling your boat out. This "washout" is caused when boat motors are rev'd up to drive the boat up onto the trailer. The DNR was notified. They said that the lower water levels have made this an area-wide problem. The number of public accesses with this problem and their limited workforce allowed them to do repair work on only a few this fall. Perhaps next spring they may get to many more. In the meantime BEWARE. Education is the best "medicine" in this case. The main lesson: Instead of power loading (revving the boat to get it onto your trailer), use the trailer winch to load and unload your boat. A New Program for Plastic Film Recycling

Oceans, rivers and lakes face a massive and growing threat from something you encounter everyday: plastics. An estimated 17.6 billion pounds of plastic leaks into the marine environment from land-based sources every year—this is roughly equivalent to dumping a garbage truck full of plastic into the oceans every minute.

Plastic films cannot be accepted by the current recycling programs, such as Becker and Hubbard County's solid waste management departments. Plastic films jam up the works at recycling centers, causing costly shut-downs and delays. Also, the type of resin used to make the softer films is not compatible with the harder plastic used for pop bottles. This means plastic bags and films must be collected separately from other recyclables. Often, they are simply thrown in the garbage, where they can be picked up by the wind and end up in the streets, backyards, lakes and rivers, and the bodies of birds and fish.

But now we have a new source for recycling plastic film products. A Virginia-based company, Trex uses recycled plastic film resin to create such wood-alternative products as composite decking, railing and benches. Trex accepts such plastic products as produce bags, shopping bags, ice bags, reclosable food storage bags, cereal box liners, pallet wrap and stretch film, case over wrap (like from packages of bottled water or toilet paper), bread bags, newspaper sleeves, dry cleaning bags, bubble wrap and plastic e commerce mailers. The Park Rapids Lions Club is participating in a community-wide recycling program focusing on plastic film products. Local businesses are collecting their own plastic waste, while public collection sites have been set up at Amish Oak Furnishings, Bella Caffé and Third Street Market, Calvary Lutheran, Riverside United Methodist and St. Peter's Catholic churches.

Will your recycling save the planet? Perhaps not, However, sometimes you can't do great, big things. Sometimes you can just do little things, like make sure that you're recycling whatever material you're using and whatever you're bringing in is the right stuff.
